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## Most common first words for a baby

FSH spikes in a few days before ovulation, and then falls after the egg is released. If you have problems 'our doctor may suggest FSH testing, which can help diagnose fertility-impaired conditions like polycystic ovarian disease and even menopause. Credit: Photolibrary/Matton Hormone hCg is made up of cells that form the placenta, an organ that attaches to the uterine wall and connects to the baby (via the umbilical cord), giving the fetus nutrients, blood and oxygen. Also known as the pregnancy hormone, hCg can be detected in a urine test 12 to 14 days after conception and will usually double every 48 to 72 hours to approximately 11. Credit: istock This is a hormone that stimulates the ovary to release a mature egg. A surge in LH causes the egg to break through the ovary and begin its journey through the ovary, where fertilization can occur. These almond-sized, oval-shaped organs are responsible for releasing a mature egg into the oars at ovulation so that sperm can fertilize them. Credit: iStockphoto Approximately 14 days before menstruation (this is the 14th day of the 28-day cycle, the 16th day of the 30-day cycle, etc.), the mature egg releases the ovary and pushes into the ovary, resulting in ovulation. Although sperm can live for several days, the egg can survive only up to 24 hours after it is released, so timing sex on ovulation is critical if you want to optimize your chances of becoming pregnant. However, there is such a word. It has been used (by mistake) instead of regardless since the early 1900s and has now been admitted to dictionaries. So while it's a word, irregardless is still far from widely accepted. And judging by the contempt he receives online, he won't be widely accepted any time soon. Merriam-Webster's advice: Use regardless. Prolyrd.com'Proly takes over' probably in text messages, but its origin goes back much earlier: the 1940s. Considered a relaxed contraction of pronunciation (such as going and outta), proly even appears in the Oxford English Dictionary. But you should definitely only use proly informally, as in: U proly I don't like what I said proly when you asked me to get you to marry. Do not miss these grammatical rules that are completely safe to ignore.Literallyrd.comHow does it take for the word to be used incorrectly before linguists give up and change its meaning? It happens literally, which literally means in a literal way or in a sense. So many speakers use it instead of almost redefining the Oxford English Dictionary literally to say it can be used to emphasize rather than actually be true, such as: 'We literally killed each other laughing.' Meanwhile, English has been left speechless reserved to mean in a literal sense. The result: Language purists refuse to use literally figuratively. Check out these other words and phrases you probably use all wrong.Anywaysrd.comDating back in the 13th century. Today it's just. Colloquially, like: I've been babbling about myself for hours. Anyway, why are you leaving? The word is considered superfluous: Most dictionaries list it as an informal synonym for anyway. The Oxford English Dictionary goes a step further. He identifies as of North American descent anyway and gives this snobbish example: You wouldn't understand all those long words anyway. Orientaterd.comLike irregardless and in any case, orient can be used, but should not. The word originated in British English in the 1840s as a variant of the Orient (both meant to determine bearings). The Yankees stuck with the Orient, which is still the preferred use - the orientate is considered non-standard in most American dictionaries. Even so, many people use it interchangeably with the orient (and disoriented for the disoriented). Collins' entry in the dictionary reads: We took such turns that I'm completely disoriented. Snuckrd.com The past time is creeping up, so why have people stuck with snuck in since the 1800s? It's a mystery; no English verb that ends in -eek sound has past tense end in -uck. Garner's list of 65 Banned Buzzwords. But it's in the dictionary now, so it's a word. Gonnard.com're going to shock you with this. (Same with conversation and conversation. We know, this is going to take some getting used to.) There's even a whole Merriam-Webster page dedicated to the verb. Like, we talked about plans for the weekend or we talked about how conversation is really at issue.
